Everard Read London is pleased to present an exhibition of new work by South African artist, Barbara Wildenboer. Using the medium of collage to powerful effect, Wildenboer's solo exhibition comprises highly textured and sculptural works that serve as contemporary vanitases within the context of the Anthropcene. The title of her first London exhibition, *FOLLY*, derives from the work of Hieronymus Bosch and his depiction of human foolishness and madness.

Through her practice, Wildenboer reflects on how humankind is affected by globalisation, economic upheavals, scarcity, pollution and manmade disasters. She explores both beauty and excess, and the magnitude of the mystery and vastness of the cosmos contrasted against the comparable insignificance of humans. She interrogates the fragility of the symbiotic relationship between man and ecology and engages with the concept of the toxic sublime - the "tensions arising from visual representations of environmental contamination." *

Using images in her collages as metaphors for the themes and preoccupations that frame her work, Wildenboer makes reference to the interconnectedness of all living things by creating visual simulations of nature that seek to convey a sense of wonder at the complicated beauty of patterns in the universe. She also alludes to the relationship between chaos and order and the sublime beauty of fractal geometry. At a young age, Wildenboer became aware of the concept of mathematics as a language and especially as the language of nature; a way to understand the universe, time, energy and matter.

Wildenboer exploits collage at luxurious scales; a microscopic image is scaled up or down and reintroduced through a variety of media, whilst exploring a range of subject matters. Collages are photographed, cut out and a new collage is created and absorbed into her visual language. Wildenboer also creates delicately-cut altered books which often contain maps, atlases and scientific subject matter, sometimes using images from the book as central elements to her pieces.

Wildenboer has exhibited in group exhibitions and art fairs internationally. This is her first solo exhibition with Everard Read London and her third solo show with the Everard Read group.

About Barbara Wildenboer

(b. 1973, Pretoria, South Africa)

Barbara Wildenboer uses a combination of analogue and digital processes to create sculptural artworks that primarily consist of collage, photo and paper-construction as well as digitally-animated photographic sculpture.

Wildenboer also creates delicately-cut altered books which often contain maps, atlases and scientific subject matter, sometimes using images from the book as central elements to her pieces. Imagery and words become components of the larger designs, as she crafts new visual narratives from the raw material.

Through her practice Wildenboer creates contemporary surrealist landscapes that provide commentary on the human condition and our negligence with respect to our natural environment. Wildenboer has participated in several group exhibitions and art fairs both nationally and internationally, including South Africa, San Francisco, Washington, London, Dubai, Sydney and Hong Kong.

Several of her collage works are permanently displayed at Linthwaite House in Britain's Lake District as part of the Leeu Hotel Group's collection.

In 2011 Wildenboer received the Public Choice Prize the Sovereign African Arts Award. She has been awarded several international residencies such as the Unesco-Aschberg residency (Jordan, 2006), the Al Mahatta residency (Palestine, 2009) and the Red De Residencias Artisticas Local (Bogota, Colombia, 2011), the Rimbun Dahan artist residency (Penang, Malaysia, 2013), L'Atelier Sur Seine (Fontainebleau, France 2016).

Wildenboer obtained a Masters in Fine Art with distinction from the Michaelis School of Art at the University of Cape Town in 2007. Prior to this she completed a BA (Ed) with majors in English literature, Psychology and Pedagogics at the University of Pretoria in 1996 followed by a Bachelor of Visual Arts from UNISA.
